I personally found the opportunity to be trained in radio production and to produce two radio shows is empowering as well as being great way to reach out to the target communities on the campaign"



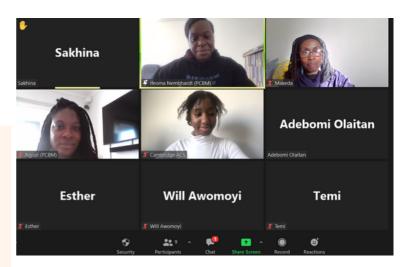

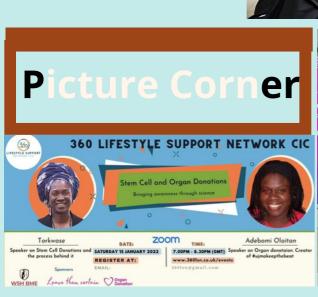
